USED AND SURPLUS STUFF PRICING GUIDE

Having recently spent a day at the annual Westminster Flea Market and wondering again how people price their stuff for sale – some at give-away prices and some at more than new prices, I decided that it was time to bring some logic into this pricing hodge-podge. I have attended the Toledo, Westchester and MARCS shows many times. As you no doubt know, they always have tables set aside for sale of used and surplus stuff. Pricing here is usually higher than at flea markets, probably because of the huge crowds offering a large population of potential buyers. And, as I have mentioned before in my columns about Toledo, the auctions seem to bring the highest prices of all for completed airplanes. But it would not be very cost effective for us to carry airplanes and other stuff from Baltimore to Toledo. Our best bet for selling built sailplanes is a free classified ad in our newsletter or at a contest, where there is a concentration of sailplane pilots.

Getting back to pricing, let's look at parts and supplies. Here are some facts as I see them: 1) Modelers at flea markets or scanning classified ads are looking for bargains; 2) They are unlikely to find something that they really need at the moment, so they must have an incentive to buy. That incentive is a low price for an item that they may have a use for in the future; 3) Whatever they buy is "as is," so there is a risk factor here over buying a new item that can be returned if defective.

How much should you ask? Here is the formula that I have used that has worked for the most part. Take the new price for the item. Consider that most modeling supplies and equipment are discounted 20%-25% for the "street" price. If you are selling a new/unused item you need to further discount the price another 25%-40% (low end for radios and components; high end for parts and supplies). This would probably be a fair price to someone who needed the item now. For someone to buy it for future use, you have to include a bargain factor. Also remember you are selling "as is." For example, you have a servo that lists for \$39.95. Street price is \$29.95. A fair price would be \$20., and you might sell it at that price if a buyer needed it and was actually looking for a servo of the kind and size you are offering. To reach the bargain hunter and ensure a sale, you would have to lower the price to, say, \$15. If you are selling a used item, a further discount must be offered. The \$39.95 servo used will probably sell at \$10. In this instance you would have to keep in mind that you are competing with "off-brand" servos that sell for \$9.95 new. Your used servo could justify its \$10 price by being a higher quality, brand name servo.

More examples: You have some covering material that you no longer need. List price: \$12.95 per roll. Street price: \$9.95. A fair price for your unopened roll: \$6.00. Include a bargain factor and the price is \$4.00. At this price you are almost certain to sell. Current-manufacture kits usually go for about half of list price, using the formula above. Older out-of-production kits often have collector value and may go for their original price or more. Keep in mind that there are not too many old kit collectors out there so if you really want to sell it quickly, use the formula.

Built airplanes are subject to no rules. They range from junk to Radoci-level construction. And they will all sell at the right price. I have seen planes that most modelers would have put in the trash can sell at a low price (low price is better than no price). Models of average construction go from kit price to perhaps 1 ½ times kit price. Pristine top-level models can go for 2 times kit price and up. As stated above, the best place to find a sailplane buyer is at a contest. If you go to the Cumberland Soar-for-Fun, that is an excellent place to sell.

As you can see, a general rule of thumb would be that new stuff should go for about half of manufacturers list price, discounted a little more if you want to reach the bargain hunters. Used stuff should go for about 25% of list price, again with a little more off if you want to reach the bargain hunters. Obviously this is not a hard and fast rule. What you can get is what somebody is willing to pay and negotiation is part of the fun of the game.

One last thought: if you itemize your tax deductions on 1040 Schedule A, it should be possible to donate certain items, such as built models and complete radio sets to a charitable organization. You can then value your items at full value – list price for new stuff and perhaps 25% off of list price for used stuff – and deduct this value from your taxable income. This will save you tax from 15% to 39.6% of your stated value, depending upon your tax bracket. Keep in mind that the IRS requires contemporaneous receipts for non-cash contributions. This means that you need to get your receipt at the time you make your donation, not six months later when you do your taxes.



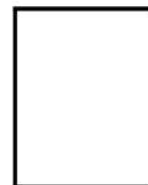
